#### From the Chair..... John Heuer

Sometimes it is as plain as the nose on your face, but like the emperor's new clothes, not always easy to see. Why would Hurricane Floyd and a couple of adverse legal rulings result in legislative proposals for permanent reductions in state support for higher education?

Why would the legislature mandate an increase in enrollment in UNC System schools and then propose to enact permanent reductions in state support for the UNC system?

Why, when the statewide electorate passed the historic higher education facilities bond by nearly a 34 majority, would the legislature propose to cut funding which would effectively nullify the initiative?

Will the citizens of North Carolina stand for this? Will we?

Chancellor Moeser, Student Body President Justin Young, and Graduate and Professional Student Association President Mikisha Brown tell us that we need to hold our ground. When I introduced a resolution for adequate funding for the University at our May 2nd Forum meeting, Forum delegates elected to replace the language about the severity of proposed budget cuts with an acclamation that ANY cuts in University funding would cause irreparable damage to our University.

Faculty Council Chair Sue Estroff tells us that we need to fine-tune our sense of the absurd when we contemplate these contradictions. She's right, of course. A healthy appreciation of the absurd is one strategy that we can employ to maintain our equilibrium. Another opportunity we have is to recognize that the act of "circling our wagons" can bring us closer together as a community. Faculty, staff, students and administrators, we need to meet this challenge together.

### Chancellor Moeser, Dana Cope Address May Forum Meeting

Wednesday, May 2, the Employee Forum heard from Chancellor James Moeser and State Employees' Association of North Carolina (SEANC) Director Dana Cope on the subject of the upcoming legislative budget negotiations.

Moeser emphasized that the reported bad news about the University's budget situation had not yet been officially enacted; the news rather had come from a joint legislative appropriations committee. However, Moeser said that the University had arrived at a critical moment, and said that it was incumbent that University employees and students rally support for the future of higher education in North Carolina. Moeser said that employees should know that if the current cuts are enacted, they would be utterly devastating to the University's mission and would do "irreparable damage." Moeser noted the waves of successive cuts that the University had absorbed over the past decade. He hoped that legislative leaders would find the political courage to identify new sources of revenue to spare the University's recurring budgets.

Moeser also noted recent progress towards an agreement with the Town of Chapel Hill that would provide lower-income employee housing in the heart of downtown.

Cope spoke about the role of SEANC as a lobbying organization on behalf of State employees. He said that it was wrong and immoral that the State of North Carolina does not find money to fund adequately its employees' pay and benefits. He also criticized the tendency of legislative leaders to make employees suffer so that the State's budget can be balanced each year. Cope said that his appointment marked SEANC's choice to take a more active stance in the annual legislative negotiations.

Cope said that SEANC stood behind the University and its employees fully in the current budget negotiations, and said that it would not let the State cut one position without raising a fuss. He decried the poor planning of both parties that put the State into this budgetary mess this year. Cope encouraged employees to take vacation leave to attend the annual SEANC rally in Raleigh May 16.

# MAKING YOUR VOICE HEARD

Reading all of the news about possible budget cuts to the University and to the State health plan, you might wonder what you can do to make your voice heard. The University has made it easy for people to contact members of the General Assembly, by accessing the "Helpful Links" section of the Government Relations page, at http://www.unc.edu/govrel/helplinks.html. Select the "How to Find Your State Legislator" link. (Employees without access to the Internet can call 962-4272 for an electronic or paper list of legislators.) These are some points to keep in mind when contacting legislators:

First, never use University time, resources or materials when contacting the Legislature. In particular, don't use office letterhead or departmental computers for this purpose. As a UNC employee, you are expected to use University resources for the State's business; contacting the Legislature is something you should do only as a citizen, in your free time. Using University resources makes you look unprofessional and could get you into trouble. So, don't do it!

Second, when contacting legislators, a hand-written message or typed letter has more impact than an e-mailed note. Legislators know that a matter is really important to the constituent when one takes the trouble to write personally.

Third, address your letter properly. The front of the envelope should read:

The Honorable (Senator's or Representative's name) North Carolina General Assembly Raleigh, North Carolina 27601

In the letter, address the legislator as "Dear Senator (last name)" or "Dear Representative (last name)."

Fourth, identify yourself. Tell the legislator who you are and where you live. Explain that you are a University and State employee, your work position and location, and mention if you are a member of SEANC. Date your letter and remember to include a return address.

Fifth, keep it short and specific. Explain why you are writing, noting the particular issue and the bill number and title if you know them. State your views on the subject, sharing how the bill will affect

you, your family, those you know and the University. Put it in personal terms and try to keep it to one page or less.

Sixth, be polite and positive. Don't threaten; instead, let them know how you feel. Thank them for their time and consideration. If the legislator responds to your letter or, better yet, supports your position, convey your thanks. Write another letter indicating your appreciation for their response and/or support.

Seventh, share your letter with someone else to make sure your handwriting is legible, your grammar is correct and your point is clear. It's always good to double-check.
